#### SPECIAL SPACES MISSION

The mission of this non-profit organization is to create dream bedrooms for children with life threatening illnesses who need to be surrounded by hope and joy while attending to their medical needs. Special Spaces wants to create an oasis in a safe and healing environment that is uniquely designed by the child. The child's bedroom will undergo a makeover according to the child's wishes. The child becomes the "designer" by picking out their favorite colors, interests and activities for their bedroom. With life threatening diseases, this is one of the few things a child may have control over. Special Spaces was founded in 2005 and has created over 90 dream bedrooms for children ages 0 to 21 years.

#### GLACIER HIGH SCHOOL'S DREAM BEDROOM MAKEOVER

Glacier High School students are creating a dream bedroom for a first grader that lives in Evergreen. Caleb Speed is a 6 year old boy with cystic fibrosis and has asked for a dream bedroom with a "dirt bike" theme. The projected reveal date for the dream bedroom is April 16, 2012.

#### PROJECT SCOPE

We are incorporating this project into our regular semester two curriculum. Classes involved with the design, manufacturing and outfitting of the bedroom are House & Interior Design, Textile Design 2, Woods 1, Woods 2 and Drafting/CAD. We are also involving individual students and GHS student organizations to promote and help with the dream bedroom makeover. Those organizations include, but are not limited to, Wolfpack Leadership Club, Student Council and National Honor Society.

### PROJECT BUDGET

The typical dream bedroom makeover costs approximately \$2,000 because most of the project is outsourced. Because we are doing a majority of the work ourselves as part of our regular curriculum, we anticipate needing approximately \$900 to purchase supplies and other miscellaneous items. Every penny raised will be used on Caleb's bedroom makeover supplies and materials.
